Ritwik Bhattacharya ... great achievement

Maharashtra had little difficulty retaining their Inter-State squash title in Calcutta in January. The strong Maharashtra team, spearheaded by recently married Nirai Shirgaonkar brushed aside Services `A'3-1 in the final round robin match.

Parth Doshi, who came in place of Saket Wali, played superbly to beat Salil Bisht 4-9, 9-3, 9-6, 9-5 in the opening encounter. Anui Kalia levelled the tie when he defeated Niraj Shirgaonkar in a rousing five-game encounter, Kalia won 8-10, 9-0, 9-3, 6-9, 9-0, Akhil Behl, as expected, brushed aside Raideep Brar 9-1, 9-3, 9-7 and Manish Chotrani cliniched the issue with a clinical 9-4, 9-1, 9-0 win over Navneet Narain.

Delhi's Ritwik Bhattacharva made history when he won the men's title in the Nationals which followed the inter-state event. Bhattacharva had won the under-19 title in the junior nationals in Delhi last year and became one of the few players to win the Junior and Senior National titles in the same year.

Bhattacharya dethroned a listless Akhil Behl in the final. Behl, who is presently studying at Trinity College, New York, was woefully out of touch and could not prevent the supremely-fit Bhattacharya from winning the title. Bhattacharya won 9-7, 9-7, 2-9, 9-2.

Mekhala Subedar, who hails from Deolali, won her third women's title on the trot. In the final, she decimated tennis-turned-squash player Sohini Kumari 9-3, 9-2, 9-1, Sohini is the younger sister of 12-times National champion Bhuvaneshwari Kumari.

hubhika Bilkha wins inaugural award

Little known Shubhika Bilkha become the first girl to bag the most promising player award at the 26th Motilal Sanghi Inter-Club squush tournament. Shubika gained the distinction by virtue of her performance in the girls under- 15 event. She surprised her more fancied rivals, Shaila Pandole and Nandita Lall. Shubhika's rapid rise since she took to the game less than two years ago can perhaps be attributed to her sporting background. She is the daughter of former Indian batsman Yaiuvindra Singh. Hopefully, the award will inspire Shubhika to devote more time and energy to squash as she joins a select band of players like Anil Navvar, Meherwan Daruwala and Adrian Ezra who went on to become national champions and acquitted themselves most creditably at International level.

The tournament attracted entries from 73 juniors, a clear indication of the growing competitive interest among the youth. Barring Siddharth Suchde, the second seed who upset Mihir Sheth in the boys under 15 event, the top seeds held sway in the other events.

Need to make state bodies stronger

There is a dire need to make the state bodies stronger if Indian squash is to rise to its full prominence. The sport has been concentrated so far only in a few metropolitan areas. Then there is need for old players, coaches and professionals to come together in formulating coaching schemes. The combination of these three is essential for we have seen so far that these three going in different directions isn't belighted the agma end.

The schemes for the betterment of the pros is welcome. We should have a regular stream of pros coming through..

A disturbing thing is that the number of schools playing the game has remained stagnant. The scope of this needs to be widened. There are hardly any girls events in schools squash round the country. This is another thing that must be addressed.

While international sports events find sponsors the national ones struggle to find one. One feels the right approach to the right people has not been made. For corporates like **Reliance**, sponsoring small budget squash events would be chicken feed. It's a pity one sport more than the others hogs the limelinh

There may be more players playing today than before but the standards are the same. Ritwik Bhattacharya is a dedicated chap and plays within his limitations. His standard must be raised by giving him exposure.

At local level, events like the Merchants Cup should be staged so that it will attract the young lot among the white collar personnel.

Above all there is need to players from the not-so affluent class. The onus should be on club to nurture such players. They can have talent search tournaments towards this end. This user the cost that the clubs would incur to adopt such players would be small percentage of their brudgets. A club could adopt a child of a professional and give him all the necessary facilities of diet and practice. Right now what charity the clubs do is to give out their courts to juniors to play during off-peak hours. Unfortunately these off-peak hours clash with the school timings and the offer cannot be taken up by all and sundry. There are encouraging signs elsewhere. In Delhi the DDA has built squash complexes. More such pay and play centres should come up so that talent from the ordinary classes can surface.

Clubs could also adopt a couple of schools so as to gain a broad base, it all needs people wantling to push things forward. Instead we have the sorry case of discontinuation of some good schemes begun in the past. There used to be an all-India schools squash tournament begun in 1986. Very little is heard about it now. Squash officials owe a responsibility to the sport to see that things go forward and not the other way.
