Ghoshal gives 2004 a heady start By Pradeep Vijayakar

If people were wondering if 2004 would be as heady as 2003 when Indian sport won title after title in unexpected quarters, two teenagers have provided the answer.

Kolkata lad Sauray Ghoshal has won the British Junior Open squash title. He thus emulates India's all-time great Anil Nayar, who won the Drysdale Cup, as it was known in the 60s when it was the unofficial world juniors championship.

Today, of course, there is the World Juniors but the British title is equally prestigious and all the top juniors played at Sheffield. Saurav beat Egytpain Adel el Said who had ousted the top seed Khalid Atlas of Pakistan. Now Khalid is ranked 84 in world professional circuit whereas as Ghoshal only began playing Satellite events towards the end of last year. That's how unexpected his triumph has been.

Joshna Chinappa had set the tone for Indians winning the British Junior Open title. She won the under-17 crown in January last year beating Aussie Donna Urquhart in the final and Egyptian Sara Badr in the semis. The under-19 crown narrowly eluded her as the Egyptian world junior No 1, Omneva Abdel Kawy beat her in the final. A few months ago Joshna was confident she would reach the final if she did not run into the Egyptian again. "The draw was such I met her in the last eight," she

said about her loss to Kawy at the World Juniors. Joshna was lucky the draw was kinder and she met Kawy only in the final. She is younger than the Egyptian so her time will come to be the No 1 among the under-19 girls in the world.

Reacting to the two performances, Indian all-time great player Brig (retd.) Rai Manchanda, now a coach in the city, said "It's a great performance". Saurav has been innovative, with more experience he can make a mark on the PSA circuit. As for Joshna she is strong and I am sure she wil be No 1 next year.

The performances of the two are a feather in the cap of the India Cements Academy where they train under Maj. Maniam and Cyrus Poncha. They get the latest facilities and have made the most of them.

He took an instant liking to it and has risen to become among the best coaches on the international circuit. In India he is better known as the coach of our national champ, Ritwig Bhattachiarya. He was in Mumbai for a coaching stim. Excerts from the interview.

How did the squash bug catch you?

I was pushed into squash by my physical education teacher. I first thought he was joking, I broke six rackets in the first month itself, but I loved the game immediately. I played very good level of badminton for England. Later I thought coaching would be a good thing for me. And I went fully into

What's your opinion about Indian players?

I think there is lot of ability here in India. The programme set up in Chennai appears to be working very well. I hope as an international coach, I can bring a slightly different view to may be speed up the programme and help the kids get better and quicker.

Where do you see our young players going?

There is a lot of hard work ahead and I think that's what they learnt during my stint. A lot more discipline and hard work is necessary to get up to the International players level. We have-been showing them quite a lot of things that the other countries are doing. The idea is to try and get them to catch up as quickly as possible.

What did you think about the facilities at the CCI?

It was a real treat to me, because I am a cricket fan and I love my cricket and to stand in a place like this and see the Indian players and also watch a match at the ground. As for the squash courts they need to be worked on to be brought to international standards, particularly the back courts. The floors are a bit dark and I know there is some renovation work soon. The coach, A.I. Singh, is doing a veryfantastic job here and the kids work hard under him.

Can more clinics like yours go on to fetch us our elusive world champ?

I will try to come back at least twice or may be three times a year. I want to try and set up an exchange, so that some of the kids can come to England and get an English experience so that they get to see how the International players are playing. Yes, we have got to of plans.

Where do you see Ritwik's future?

Bluwiks been with me nearly three years now. When he first came to me, I chort really think he understood what being a professional player was. I had to mould him as a person. In terms of personal development, he has been able to fulfil a lot of potential. Last year he realised what it takes to become a top-class player. I am pleased with his rankings, he is morning in the right direction. He should be constant in the top 60 and in the next two years he could move to top 30.

What suggestions would you give to the Squash Racquets Association of Maharashtra (SRAM)?

To expand the sport in the state. I think there is a good system in place, only it needs to be monitored. The level of competition needs to be assessed. Iknow it's difficult geographically but regional development is important. Plus addition of techniques that would equip the players to go abroad and do well in tournaments abroad.

What advice would you give to the new comers?

Just work very hard at the game and make sure that you keep enjoying it.

INDIANS LOSE TIE, WIN FRIENDS

SINGAPORE, February 5

PAKISTAN AVENGED last Sundays defeat as they beat India 3-0 to retain their stranglehold on the Asian Junior Squash Championships. It was a highly disciplined performance by them against an Indian side that played its heart out. Rishad Billimoral had a great chance to take a two games lead against Kumall Mahmood in the opener. Had that happened, the pressure would have been on the Pakistani who till then, had been comprehensively outplayed.

Billimoria made seven unforced errors in this second game. A backtreaking rally, over a hundred strokes, saw him put a forehand boast into the tin. This gave Mahmood the second game. He had trailed by a game and was 1-5 down before the revival began. One had to feel for Billimoria. He had given it everything and yesterday's hard semi-final was taking its toll. Mahmood won 2-9, 9-7, 9-2, 9-2 after sixty-four minutes.

Pakistan had dropped Imtiaz Khan, their number one player, from their team. Asghar Khan soon vindicated coach Gogi Allaudin's decision to do so as he beat Paul Ferreria 9-4, 9-4, 9-5 in 37 minutes.

Akbar Khan had a relatively easy time in the first and second games against Vineet Asthana. A brief flutter by the Indian saw him each tup at 5-5 in the second game, having trailed 0-4 and 1-5. Akbar led 6-0 in the third and it looked all over. The Indian hadn't given up. He took advantage of some careless play by the Pakistain and a penalty stroke gave him this third game. There was hardly any resistance from Asthana in the fourth and he managed just one point 9-5, 9-5, 7-9, 9-1 to Akbar after 43 minutes. Coach Ananth Nayak felt that Pakistan were the better side on the day. 'It would be incorrect to make any excuses. This was a pressure match and they handled the situation better,' he suggessed.

The Indians had come here with just two weeks preparation, that too being interrupted by the disturbance in **Bombay**. They have earned the respect of the teams here and have shown that Pakistan can be beaten.
