Farrukh knocked out Manish Chotrani 9-3, 9-1, 9-0. Mansoor outplayed Ritwik Bhattacharya 9-0, 9-1, 9-6. Pakistan and India bagged a singles gold each, Mansoor beat compatriot Shahid Zaman in five-setter. The world No 19 from Peshawar twice came back from a game down, and in the fifth was

Chennai's Joshna Chinappa ruled the roost in the absence of her archrival Mekhala Subedar. She claimed the under-19 and the women's titles. Chinappa routed Sonali Philip 9-1, 9-0, 9-0 in the juniors but had a little contest in the women's final. Here Mumbai teenager Alisha Mashruwala played some effortless winners which wrong-footed Joshna, But the Chennai girl, 17, is really strong and that carried her to a 9-4, 9-6, 9-5.

Among professionals a new name came to light. Vijay Sonawane of Otters made it to the final where he lost to Balamurugan. He gave a fight in the third set. He says he plans to do better next time around. A new face was there in the over-45 with professional Prakash Yelve meting Vaman Apte in the final. The match was well contested.

In girls under-15 Surbi Mishra showed promise. It is good to see talent from Rajasthan coming through not only from Chennai and Maharashtra. In the under-11 Sachika Balwani kept her nerve in face of competition from Chennai's A. Anaka.
