Minister for Sports, Gord of Maharashtra), Shri Harshvardhan Patil (Chief Patron of ISP & Minister Gord of Maharashtra), Shri Govindrao Adik (MP) & Sudhir Sood (Secretary Squash, Bömbay Gymkhang)

a squash academy in Mumbai may soon become or reality as Shir Padmakar Valvi, Minister of Sports, Government of Maharashtra is making concerted efforts to procure land in Mumbai. Shir Valvi was speaking at a function hosted by the Bombay Gymkhana and organised by SRAM and ISP to felicitate the six junior winners of National titles at the recently concluded Junior National Squash Championships and the four players who finished runners-up.

Also present on the occasion was Shri Harshvardhan Patil, Minister of Parliamentary Affairs, and Chief Patron of ISP, besides officials from SRAM and ISP.

Maharashtra, led by the talented Mahesh Mangaonkar and Yohan Pandole, procured a rich haul of six gold medals from the ten at stake, with four players winning silver medals in the Junior Nationals in Jodhpur.

This has been largely due to the efforts of the Squash Racquets Association of Maharashtra (SRAM), the support from the squash NGO, Indian Squash Professionals, the selfless dedication of a bunch of committed coaches, great efforts from the parents and

the proliferation of squash courts in the city.

In 2011, the State Government recognized SRAM as the official body representing the sports of Squash in Maharashtra, and concerted efforts are now on to gain as much financial and infrastructural support as possible to help players who have played at an international level, besides all the National champions who are harbouring aspirations of turning professional in the near future.

Players who crowned themselves National champions are Mahesh Mangaonkar (Boys U-19), Yohan Pandole (Boys U-15), Aryaman Adik (Boys U-13), Yeer Chotrani (Boys U-11), Urvashi Joshi (Giris U-17), Daksha Pathak (Girls U-13) and runners-up are Tushar Sahani (Boys U-11), Adili Raheji (Girls U-11), Kilikid Joshi (Girls U-13), Saumya Karki (Girls U-1)

Besides winning the National titles, most of the players have also made a name for themselves on the junior interrutional stage. Mahesh Mangaonkar has been British Open Junior Champion 2009, Scottish Open Junior Champion 2007. German Open Junior Champion 2008. Scottish Open Junior Champion 2007. German Open Junior Champion 2018. The stage of the World Junior women's team Squash Championship 2011, Indian Boston, USA and was an U-19 semi-finalist. # World Under 21 Squash Championship 2012

Egypt Deny India World Cup Under-21 Triumph

(06/02/2012)

n a dramatic clash which went the full distance, forourites Egypt eventually overcame surprise apponents India 2/1 in the final of the SDAT WSF Under-21 World Cup to deny the hosts a historic first world title in the inaugural World Squash Federation event before an eestatic crowd at the Express Avenue Mall in Chennai.

It was a tall order for India in the opening match where team number one Ravi Dixit, ranked 183 in the world, faced Egypt's world No33 Marwan El Shorbagy, the highest-ranked man in the tournament. But El Shorbagy, still only 18, stamped his authority to win 11-4, 11-7, 7-11, 11-7 in 58 minutes - and put Egypt into the lead.

But the match of the championship then followed - in which the star of Indian squash Dipika Pallikal, the highest-ranked woman in the event, faced Egyptian rival Nour El Sherbini.

Chennai born-and-bred Pallikal took the opening game, but to the dismay of the crowd, Sherbini wan the next two to move obsend. The Egyptian maintained her control of the match to march an to match bull at 10-6. But Pallikal was not about to concede and, urged on by the exuberant crowd, clawed her way back into the game - saving four match halls to draw level.

The crowd arupted - shouting and screaming more than ever before - and it as some time before the local heroine was able to resume play. Twice more Sherbini moved to within a single point of the title - and twice Pollikal fought back before finally converting her own first game ball - having saved six match -balls - to win the game 14-12.

With crowd scenes and screams rarely witnessed before at a squash event, Pallikal returned to the court inspired. After losing two points from 8-3 up, she returned the next serve into the nick, delivered a delicate back hand drop shot again into the nick before winning the third on a 'no let' to claim a sensational 11-7, 4-11, 8-11, 14-12, 11-5 victory ofter 74 long minutes.

Later, the Indian champion who is now coached by Australian legend

Sarah Fitz-Gerald, admitted that the match had been her toughest of all-time. "I spoke to Sarah this morning and I knew she'd be watching - and all I could think about, when I was match-ball down, was what would I tell her when we next spoke.

"She had told me to keep going until the very end - the game's not over until somebody wins - and that's where I got my strength and confidence." explained Pallikal.

"And I didn't want to lose in front of my family and friends."

With the crowd now sensing a shock victory, the semi-final hero Ramit Tandon took to the court to face Egypt's Karrin Abdel Gawad in the decider. Gawad, a 20-year-old ranked 42 in the world, took the first game after a lie-break and then moved 27 dhead. But spurred on by the increasingly noisy crowd, Kolkata-born Tandonranked almost 300 places below his opponent - bettled hard and took the third game to reduce the deficit.

But as the Egyptian reclaimed the advantage in the fourth, the crowd became more muted until Gawad eventually clinched his third match-ball to win 12-10, 11-4, 6-11, 11-8 after 67 minutes to earn the title for Egypt.

"It was a quality match for both sides - but I'm happy we did it for the second time," said Egyptian coach Amir Wagih, making reference to his country's victory almost 12 months earlier in the senior World Cup in Chennai.

op seed and current world no 2 Nick Matthew won his first J.E.Morgen Tournament of Champions title defeating his long-time rival James Willstrop, current world no 1 and the second seed 8-11,11-9,11-5,11-7 before a jam packed crowd that was glued to their seats it Vnadrebilt Hall al Grand Cartnal Terminal, New York.

It was an especially jubilant victory for the 30-year-old Englishman who was in his fourth Tournament of Champions final and playing his first tournament after two months off the tour to recover from an injury.

In the women's event squash mom Natalie Grinham beat her 20 year old opponent Dipika Pallikal in 3 straight games.

"Dipika is quite handy with the racquet and she volleys quite well, so I

made sure not to put the ball where she could easily reach it," said Grinham, who was relentless in picking up every offensive effort that Pallikal threw at her.

The former world no 2 also used length and width to keep her opponent out of the middle of court. Grinham's crosscourt drop from the front left wall proved especially effective.

"I just didn't have any strength left in my legs," said the rising star from India who was playing her ninth match in 10 days.

However, Dipika Pallikal became the first Indian ever to reach the final of Tournament of Champions when she clinched a three-set thriller against New Zealand's Jaclyn Hawkes.

What was truly commendable was the fact that Akanksha's performance was consistent and she played well without being under pressure. She played to be better player every time she took centre stage and raised the bar a notch higher and in the end put Gao on the world map, showing one and all that yes here was a quality player from a tiny Indian state that had the potential to make it big and the one who held a great deal of promise.

Akanksha's father Cdr Hemant Salunkhe pointed out that Akanksha's steady rise up the ladder by finishing 9th in the British Open and claiming the second place in the Scottish tournament can be artifibuted to her sheer hard work and more importantly her coach, Mr Rehman Saiyed who while being in small place like Goa had succeeded in moulding his ward into such a formidable player that the world is taking note of.




PROSQUASH: What do you aim to achieve by playing squash and what are your targets?
