## WISPA Chennai Open Women's squash tournament Joshna wins her maiden WISPA crown in Chennai

ostna Chinappa baggad her maiden WISPA crown — sixth overall — in her hometown, hardly seven months after recovering from a major knee surgery. The 25-year-old Indian gave it her all in scripting a 9-11, 11-4, 11-8, 12-10 win over England's Sarah Jane Perry in the final of the Chennai Open \$10,000 women's squash tournament at the Indian Squash Academy.

Shrugging off a hesitant start where she lost her first game, Joshna came back strongly in the second. Sarah made a lot of uncharacteristic errors especially on the backhand. Joshna took a 7-3 lead, her confidence started to grow and she beat Sarah in the second 11-4.

After taking the third game in a pretty close battle, Joshna held the mental edge. But it was Sarah who started off well, running away to a 7-3 lead in the fourth. Joshna didn't give up as she retrieved exceptionally to equalise at seven each.

Ranked eleven places below Sarah at 71, Joshna had two match points at 10-8, but Sarah saved both. At 11-10, Joshna was lucky to get a 'let', and then a backhand error from Sarah sav Joshna win the title.

"It's great to win my first title in Chennai after being in the final twice earlier. I'm grateful to be playing, let alone winning. Winning is a bonus," said Joshna, who received \$1900 and 350 ranking points.

N ick Matthew overcame fiery Egyptian Ramy Ashour in straight games in the final of the Allam British Open to secure his place in history as the first Englishman to win the world's most famous squash tille for a third time.

The 31-year-old from Sheffield produced a high level of accuracy throughout the match to win 11-9, 11-4, 11-8 in 49 minutes in front of a near capacity audience watching the PSA World Series event at the O2 Arena in London.

In the women's event it was Nour El Sherbini's first major final as a senior, whereas her opponent Nicol David had already won three British and six World Open titles along with countless others.

But young Nour acquitted herself well, beyond any reasonable expectations if we're honest, staying with Nicol for the first half of the first two games before Nicol pulled clear to take them 11/6, 11/6, 11/6.

# Deepika Pallikals interview in fram corner of squashsite.com

NAME : Dipika Pallikal AGE : 20 HOME TURF : Chennai, India

WHO AM I: India's number one woman's squash champion and ranked number 14 internationally.

CURRENTLY I AM : Preparing for the Allam British Open Squash Championships 2012.

HOW IT ALL BEGAN : I started playing squash when I was just 10 years old, as a weekend pursuit, and not formal training. I had played tennis for a year, so I was quite familiar handling the racket. What kept me going was that I could hit the balls more times than any other kid on the court.

COACH CATCH : When I began, my coach was Hariom Tripathi, and then I started training with Cyrus Poncha, My current coach is five – time world champion, Sarah Fitz-Gerald.

LEARNING CURVE : At 14, 1 moved to Egypt for four years, I had to walk from my house to the club for practice sessions. And it was tough to be away from family and friends. I then moved to England for a year, and since then I've been living between Melbourne, Australia and India.

**PET PEEVES**: What really bothers me is that squash is such a male-dominated spot, especially in India. Ive heard people (even within the Indian Squash Academy) say things like, "No ano evants to see the women's matches because they aren't exciting enough", "You girls don't move fast on the courts like the boys do". And the funny part is, in terms of world ranking, the Indian women's team, led by me, ranks higher than the men's team.

TOP SPOTS : If you want to go pro, some of the best spots for training are Egypt, England, France and Hong Kong.

INSPIRATION : Malcolm Willstrop coached me when I moved to England. That when I met James Willstrops (his son and the number one squash player in the world). I used to constantly play with his girlfriend, Yanessa Atkinson. And even though they are worlds champions, they take time out to train younger players.

INNER CIRCLE: I am very close to my family, especially my two older sisters, Divya and Diya. Divya is a chartered accountant and Diya is a graphic designer. I'm always kidding around and telling them how they stole all the brains of the family, so I had no choice but to play a sport. I do miss hanging out with my friends on a daily basis, but when I look at it objectively I know that it's all with the sacrifice.

STYLE FILES: I go to the US about twice a year and that's when I take a week off from practice and matches. I literally shop till I drop. People mistake me for a tomboy but I am the opposite. I love florals, pretty parels and everything girly.

This tournament was held on 26th and 27th April at one of the most scenic locations near Delhi, dog be Aravali hills and in the grand premises of the Pathways school. The competition schools like Modern Barakhamba , DPS R K Puram , Hamdard , and Ahlcon International had a tradition of squash, while Pathways , Kandriya Vidyaldya, R K Puram, Step by Step International (Japur) and Sanskriti were the new entrants. The Pathways management was gracious enough to let the team stoy 2 nights at their plush apartments used as domitories with all meals included, in one of the best self service cafeterias in the country.

This was the first time that a KV squash team (U -17 boys) had entered a squash interschool and apart from Shaurys Bharma, who being from an Air Force family had prior experience of the game, the rest were all novices with minimal practice but unbridled determination. Amongst the KV newcomers Saurab has practice the most and has the best understanding of the game. They had just a couple of day's intensive practice with their coach Akash Sharma and some mentoring by Rahul Kumar who initiated and oversees the KV squash program. The other KV players according to rank were 2. Sourob Babu 3. Radha Krishna 4. Tanay Wadodkar and 5. Deswarth Anas.

Their first match was against Pathways B, and by their grithy performance the score stood at 2 matches all and the decider was a matter of nerves and will to win. Destwarth Anas, despite his badminton background ran down every ball and won 3-1 to create the first historic win for the KV Team.

The 2nd match was against the 1st seeds from Hamdard who had produced some junior National champions but KV boys had no respect for reputations and gave their best. Shaurya took a game off Junaid , the 1st seed of the tournament and a spirited Tanay Wadodkar playing at no 4 ensured the only victory against the champions.

The 3rd match was against a Step by Step who have 2 courts of their

own and are trained by Naveen Jhangra a top level National player who has just curtailed playing the circuit to concentrate on caaching. The KV Players undaunted by reputation demolished the opposition 5-0 to obtain the 3rd position and thus ensuring a successful outing at their first attempt.

The Pathways A team beat Hamdard in both the U-15 & U-17 finals and incidentally the former's top players irrain at KV whenever possible and it is amongst the best cademies in India that produces nationally and internationally ranked players. The future is bright for the KV players if they choose to pursue squash at the highest level and not aboundly avail via use to studie set.

# PROSQUASH speaks to squash players Sandeep Jhangra and Vikas Jhangra (Services/ Air Force / Naval Squash Champions) and Rhea Badal



Sandeep Jhangra & Vikas Jhangra are both ex-Junior Natinal Champion and top ranked in the mens category for several years.

PROSQUASH – What are the reasons as both of you have been declining in the National Rankings.

Sandeep Jhangra and Vikas Jhangra

Sandeep/Vikas - There is a lack of top class coaches in India. There is no support from the SRFI (National Federation) as they are only promoting Tamil Nadu players as all office bearers are common. Unlike many TNSRA players we had to pay our own PSA membership feas as the SRFI does not present our case to the Sports Ministry for funding. Then due to the lack of promotion of squash it has not gathered mass appeal and thus there is a shortage of sponsors.

# PROSQUASH – How are you going to overcome these problems?

Sandeep/Vikas - We have realized not to depend on the SRFI anymore but take our own initiative to recover lost ground.

### PROSQUASH – Along with other players both of you have also not got your CWG allowances.

Sandeep,/Vikas - Both of us actually spent about 6 months training at the TNSRA academy before and after the SAF Games during the CWG funding period. Unfortunately we had to stay at the SDAT facilities outside the academy and were given no food, supplements, fruit juices or daily allowance and even the room was paid by us personally, despite the GOI howing released these funds for us. We were not even allowed to watch TV or have meals in the academy activeties.

PROSQUASH – Do you know that SRFI has disaffiliated SSCB from squash and what are your thoughts about that? Sandeep/Vikas - This had to happen as the Services were anyway have increased deprite how the the area to be a services were anyway

being ignored despite having the maximum courts in India and our players represented India and having won the Nationals /Inter State numerous times.

Rhea Badal – 11th Standard – Choate Rosemary Hall – Wallingford, Connecticut. USA

### What is your squash background before you left for USA

Rhea Badal - I was being trained by the Egyptian coach Omar at the KV Squash Academy in Delhi and studying at Vasant Valley in Divij Kadans class. I represented the first Purjab Inter State U-19 Girls squash team at the 2010 junior nationals, as their top Jayer.

### PROSQUASH – What is the difference between the squash scenario here and there and do you have a dedicated women's coach?

Rhea Badal - They are more focussed and have a more professional attitude towards the game. A competitive enviornment ensures that we maintain our standard. Our coach is Rebeac Schiller and she is every efficient.

# At Khelshala, deprived kids dream big

CHANDIGARH: In the dead heat of May, the basement of a hotel at Attawa village is a 'cool' place to be. There is no whir of tireless air conditioners, but here, the dividing line between the two Indias seems to blur. A line of underprivileged kids troops in to pick up books, indulae in a passion for the 'elite' game of squash and, most importantly, learn to dream 'big'. Instructing them is a former Harvard University coach and his dedicated team of teachers. Maniit Singh, the 17-year-old son of a mason whose mother died two years ago, has put away his arief and found a new dream at



Khelshala— to earn a sports scholarship to Harvard.

At Satinder Bajwa's Khelshala, 27 children of the lower working classes, such as scrap pickers, electricians, masons, carpenters and street vendors embody the new buzzword of an aspiring nation — empowerment.

Komal's father, a recycler of high society wastage, died. "I come to Khelshala baccuse I like to play squash and study. The time I get from helping my mother at home. I spend at Khelshala. But I will soon have to leave Khelshala because my mother can't make the two ends meet and we will have to go back to our village in Sultanpu, UP; says Komal.

Baiva, known in the world of squash for having mentored alltime great Jansher Khan, has invested his life's savings into these children. Some charitable trusts help Baiva maintain the two squash courts and the expenses of his Khelshala. "It is better to impart knowledge to these children than to hand out clothes and money and doles. Unlike cricket or football, squash can be played in a small space, is a lifetime skill and doesn't require more than one playing partner; says Baiva.

Manish, the headboy at Khelshala, has learnt squash so well that he now plays with the regular members from affluent sections.<sup>11</sup> have learnt here how to speak well and communicate with different people. Kids from my background, who do not have the opportunity of Khelshala, Lack these skills, he says, as Manijit, another student, quips, "It is the value of discipline that we have learnt here. Had the culture of our homes been disciplined, we would have done better in our lives."



### To hell with male chauvinism (Article in deccanchronicle.com)

Sonice Mirzo's accusation that All India Tennis Association's handling of the Olympics selection reeked of male chauvinism has rekindled the debate of gender discrimination in sports. Even the founder of the modern Olympics, Baron Pierre de coubertin, said in 1896, "No matter how toughened a sportswoman may be, her organism is not cut out to sustain certain shacks." Since then, gender equality in sports has come a long way.

Sania's jibe is just the tip of the iceberg as women in other sports too are going through torrid times. Shuttle star Jwala Gutta has been fighting for a while against the alleged step-motherly treatment of the Badminton Association of India. In squash, Joshna Chinnappa had to win a "court battle" against the Squash Rackets Federation of India that banned her for "indiscipline" and more recently the federation showed no interest in recommending Dipika Pallikal's name for the Ariung Award despite the Chennai airl's landmark achievement of becoming the first Indian in world top 15. She also helped India win their first gold in Asian championship. "It's always been there. I have suffered the same way. It is quite ridiculous. We have so many female athletes, big names who have done really well in sports. Many might be afraid to take up sports as a career." Jwala has been auoted as saving. Recently, the National Commission for Women wrote to sports minister Aiay Maken alleging discrimination in acknowledging the contribution of women. The letter was sent when the BCCI disbursed Rs 70 crore from the IPL surplus as a one-time payment benefit to 160 former international and domestic players who retired prior to 2004.

Slamming the BCCI for ignoring the effort of women, former players led by veteran Diana Edulji went up in arms. Ex-India cricketer Susan Pallikal, mother of Dipika, says, "Why should there be discrimination? A woman is second to none. If former male players are entitled to payment, women should also get it. We also represented the country with pride. We are not competing with men, just asking for our rights." And the discrimination is not only in prize money. While men cricketers get even more attention than they need - for instance, every move of cancer-stricken Yuvraj Singh has been lapped up as news, and his oft-repeated statements like 'I want to play in the T20 World Cup', get such wide coverage women athletes have to shine that extra bit for them to get noticed. And when they are injured or sick, no one bothers about them, Will this ever change? PT Usha: Olympian and winner of four Asian Games gold medals broke down in front of media in 2009 when she was asked to share accommodation with five others during the national championship in Bhopal . Jwala Gutta: India 's No. 1 doubles player in badminton lashed out at the Badminton Association of India president V.K. Verma after winning the Commonwealth Games gold medal for not even congratulating her.
